Bond Secures \$1.5 Million for Truman State University's Magruder Hall

Sen. Kit Bond has notified Truman State University that he has secured \$1.5 million from the Senate Appropriations Committee for the purchase of Life Sciences lab equipment for Truman's new science building.

"This money for new labs in Magruder Hall will help Truman play a leading role in Missouri's drive to remain the national leader in the life sciences revolution," Bond said. "By staying at the cutting edge of this new industry, we are making sure that Missouri remains a magnet for good-paying, high-technology jobs."

Bond's announcement came as great news for Truman President Barbara Dixon. "The Board of Governors and I are delighted that this funding will allow Truman State University to provide enhanced opportunities to our students for life sciences training and research," Dixon said.
"These opportunities will positively impact
the life sciences workforce and economic
development in northeast Missouri and
throughout the state. We are indebted to
Senator Bond for recognizing this critical
need and enabling this enhancement to our
academic program."

The University will use the money to purchase equipment for a new biochemistry laboratory, organic chemistry laboratory, animal science laboratory and advanced cell/molecular biology laboratory, and for a new classroom and laboratory facility for agriculture education and research at the University Farm.

The funding also must be approved by the full Senate and approved by the House of Representatives before becoming law with the president's signature.

Deadlines for Nationally Competitive Scholarships Approach

Looking for a competitive scholarship, but not sure which one applies to you? Many nationally competitive scholarships are available, but deadlines are quickly approaching for several University-sponsored scholarships. The Truman deadline is set approximately a month before the national deadline.

The George Mitchell Scholarship, which allows students to study abroad in Ireland, has a Truman deadline of Sept. 10. The Rhodes Scholarship, for seniors who wish to study at Oxford, has a Truman deadline of Sept. 11. The Fulbright Scholarship for seniors aiming to receive their post-bachelor's degree in foreign countries has an approaching deadline. Exact dates depend on the type of degree the student is to receive.

The Woodrow Wilson/Andrew Mellon Scholarship is for students who wish to pursue a doctorate in humanities. The Truman deadline is Nov. 18. The Harry S. Truman scholarship, for juniors active in public service, has a Truman deadline of Dec. 15. The Barry M. Goldwater Scholarship, for sophomores and juniors who intend to pursue careers in math, natural sciences and engineering, also has a Dec. 15 Truman deadline.

Assistance with the application process is available. University representatives can help with reviewing drafts, compiling transcripts and letters of recommendation, setting up mock interviews, and meeting with students early in their academic careers to discuss specific strategies for becoming competitive candidates. They also can help with strategies for selection of prospective referees for letters of recommendation.
