Truman Alumnus, Former Board Member Becomes HUD Secretary Designate

Alphonso Jackson, Truman Alumnus and former Board of Governors member, has been selected by President George W. Bush to become the 13th secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development pending a U.S. Senate confirmation.



Bush nominated Jackson to become HUD's deputy secretary on March 9, 2001, and that nomination was unanimously confirmed by the U.S. Senate on June 3, 2001.

As deputy secretary, Jackson served as HUD's Chief Operating Officer, overseeing the day-to-day operations of the \$32 billion agency with a core mission of providing affordable housing and promoting community and economic development.

Jackson came to Washington as the

president of American Electric Power-TEXAS, a \$13 billion utility company, located in Austin, Texas.

From January 1989 until July 1996, Jackson was president and CEO of The Housing Authority of the City of Dallas, Texas, a \$100 million operation.

Previous to The Housing Authority of the City of Dallas, Jackson was director of the Department of Public and Assisted Housing in Washington, D.C., a \$137 million operation. Also, he served as chairperson for the District of Columbia Redevelopment Land Agency Board.

Jackson received a bachelor's degree in political science and a master's degree in education administration from Truman and a law degree from Washington University School of Law.

Unity IX, a celebration of unity through song, dance and words, will take place at 3 p.m., Jan. 19, in Baldwin Auditorium. Unique Ensemble Gospel Choir, Praise Dancers and other Truman students will perform.

A step show titled "March into the Future - Steppin' for the Past" will be the

featured event at the fourth annual Unity Luncheon at noon, Jan. 20, in the SUB Georgian Room. Doors will open at 11:30 a.m. The Martin Luther King Jr. Statewide Committee will provide financial assistance for the event. The performers will demonstrate the heritage and origins of stepping, a traditionally African American art form of handclapping, footstomping and rhythmic movements done in unison by a group.

Cost for the luncheon is \$7.50 and those who plan to attend should R.S.V.P. by Jan. 16 to the Public Relations Office at 785.4016.

Truman and MCC Sign Transfer Agreements

Truman and Metropolitan Community Colleges (MCC) have finalized 25 articulation and credit transfer agreements that will allow MCC students who complete an associate's degree to transfer the maximum number of credits and make a seamless transition to Truman.

The agreements are in the areas of accounting, agriculture, art history, biology, business, chemistry, communication, economics, English, French, German, justice systems, math, philosophy, psychology, physics, religion, Spanish and social anthropology.

Europe in Transition to Visit Normandy Coast, Brussels, Luxembourg, Heidelberg/Mannheim

An international study program titled "Europe in Transition" will leave for the Normandy coast, Brussels, Luxembourg, Heidelberg/Mannheim, Strasbourg and Paris on May 12 and return May 29. Participants will earn six hours of academic credit. University policy allows students to fulfill three hours of the inter-cultural requirement and three hours of elective credit.

The brochure, available in the Business and Accountancy Division office, details a program which will be a life-changing experience. Students may read about the things they will experience, but to experience them is to really understand them. In a world which is more global every day, the travel experience will help students understand the people of other cultures. With this understanding students will be able to interact, conduct business, and live more peacefully in a fast-changing world.

Europe in Transition is an approved study abroad program of Truman State University.

Mary Giovannini, professor of business and administration, has organized and conducted this program for 14 years. Jason Lin, professor of business administration and co-leader of the group, has participated in the program since 1997.

Students will study the European Union

and the effects of the Euro. Students will learn about and interpret cultural events and historical events as time permits. Beginning the first week of February, weekly study classes will be held. Readings are required. As a part of the study meetings, participants will listen

to speakers on the European Union, speakers from countries they will visit, and orientation sessions. The more one knows about these matters ahead of time, the more that will be learned from the on-site experience.

Each student is expected to keep a journal starting with the first study-orientation class. While traveling, the student will keep track of places visited, the people talked with and their impressions about the conversations and events. Students are required to write a paper upon returning to the United States. In the paper the student will combine information from readings and lectures with actual experiences. The paper will be due June 30.

Hattie McDowell, senior nursing major from Bonne Terre, Mo., was recently invited

to present her research at the Ninth Annual Research Day at Blessing-Rieman College of Nursing in Quincy, Ill. Her presentation, "Prenatal Screening for HIV in Northeast Missouri," was based on undergraduate research conducted during summer 2003.

This research project, funded by Truman, involved a telephone survey to obstetrical providers in a six county area. She determined 73 percent of obstetrical providers routinely screened prenatal clients for HIV.

Kit Hadwiger, assistant professor of nursing; Stephen Hadwiger, associate professor of nursing; Rebecca McClanahan, assistant professor of nursing; and Stephanie Powelson, nursing program director and associate professor of nursing; also presented sessions during the Research Day.

Sara Murray, junior health science major from Eden Prairie, Minn., has been selected to the 2003-2004 Academic All-America Women's Soccer Team. **Tameem Yehyawi, senior biology major from Keokuk, Iowa**, has been selected to the 2003-2004 Academic All-America Football Team. To be eligible, a student-athlete must be a varsity starter or key reserve, maintain a cumulative GPA of 3.20 on a scale of 4.0, have reached sophomore athletic and academic standing at his/her current institution and be nominated by his/her sports information director.
