Truman Mathematics Teams Place First, Fourth Among 25 Teams in Missouri

At the recent ninth annual Missouri MAA Collegiate Mathematics Competition, Truman's Team A won first place and Truman's Team B won fourth place. This is the first time both Truman teams have won an award.

The competition was held at Southeast Missouri

State University in Cape Girardeau, Mo., April 1-2. Twenty-five teams competed in the contest this year.

Members of Truman's Team A are Evan Merrell, senior mathematics major from Jefferson City, Mo.; Kelly Steinmetz, senior mathematics major from Alexandria, S.D.; and Khang Tran, senior computer science and mathematics double major from Saigon, Vietnam.

Truman's Team B consisted of Chris Bay, senior mathematics and computer science double major from Fenton, Mo.; Carlos DiStefano, senior music and physics double major from Kirksville; and Bach

Ha, freshman computer science and mathematics double major from Hanoi, Vietnam. Both of Truman's teams were sponsored by Steve Smith, professor of mathematics.

Each team is allowed to solve as many of the given 10 problems as possible in five hours.

Truman Chemistry Department Ranks in Top 25 Nationally for Preparedness

Truman State University ranked No. 22 in the nation for the preparation of American Chemical Society-certified Bachelor of Science graduates in chemistry for the 2001-2002 academic year.

This achievement was

announced in the March 29 edition of the weekly chemistry newsmagazine, *Chemical and Engineering News.*

The Truman chemistry department tied with Georgia Southern University, Pennsylvania State University, University of Illinois-Chicago and San Diego State University with 22 ACS-certified chemistry graduates for the 2001-2002 academic year.
