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The Men of Truman Nursing

The male role in the nursing field has become more widely recognized and accepted over the last decade. Over the last 60+ years, several men have graduated from Truman's nursing program, more than some of us had realized. Within the last five years, three males have been elected as class "co-president." The Class of 2011 was co-led by **Alex Sievert**, the Class of 2014 was co-led by **Zachary Esperanza**, and the Class of 2016 is currently co-led by **Alex Scherr**. Listed below are several male Truman nursing alumni and summaries of their professional nursing careers so far.



Emily, Joe, Benjamin, and newborn Henry Hassler

Joe Hassler '07

After graduation, Hassler started a critical care fellowship at Mercy Medical Center in St. Louis, MO. He worked for 3 years in the med/surg/ neuro/trauma ICU before moving on to graduate school in 2010 at Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville, where he studied nurse anesthesia. He married Emily Hassler née Glidewell (also a Truman grad) in March 2010. Hassler stated, "2013 was a busy year for my family with starting my new job as a CRNA at Mercy Hospital in Washington, MO, and welcoming our first son, Benjamin, a few months later. In February 2015, we added a second son, Henry, and I became the education clinical coordinator for the anesthesia department. I really enjoy both teaching and performing anesthesia. It's been very rewarding. My Truman education has set me up well for success."



Matthew Doellman, '06

Since graduation, Doellman was commissioned as an officer in the U.S. Army and has been stationed at Fort Riley, KS, Fort Sam Houston, TX, and Fort Leonard Wood, MO. Currently in Fort Leonard Wood, he is the Head Nurse of the Emergency Department. When asked about his nursing education at Truman and where

it has taken him in his professional career he stated, "The highlight of my professional career has been my deployment to Afghanistan in 2011 where I was in charge of Trauma Resuscitation with the 2nd Forward Surgical Team. The training I received at Truman and earning my BSN prepared me to have the confidence and knowledge to provide combat casualty care for wounded service members in a deployed environment. Spring Break! We are enjoying warm and sunny spring weather in Kirksville. The academic year has been busy for faculty, staff, and students. The senior class and five faculty members participated in Missouri Nurse Advocacy Day to speak with legislators about funding for Medicaid expansion and removing barriers to practice. Students also organized and offered several activities, including World AIDS Day, screenings for HIV and sexually transmitted diseases, a campus health fair, and other events.

Faculty and staff have been actively working with the Accelerated BSN (ABSBN) and traditional students. The first ABSN cohort participated in the Nursing Recognition Pinning Ceremony in December. Jeff Burgess, '94

Lt. Col. Jeffrey C. Burgess enlisted in the United States Army in 1986 as a combat medic and dental technician. He graduated with a BSN in 1994 from Truman (formerly known as Northeast Missouri State University). He went on to obtain a Master of Science in Health Sciences-Emergency and Disaster Management degree from Trident University in Cypress, California. Burgess entered the Air Force in 1998 and has served at several air force bases around the world. He spent a majority of his nursing career in and around the operating room, from operating room nurse to nurse manager of a surgical unit specializing in care of patients before, during, and after surgery. Lt. Col. Burgess is currently the 959th Operating Room Flight Commander at the San Antonio Military Medical Center. Within this position, he oversees 170+ anesthesiologists, CRNA, PACU nurses/techs and OR nurses/techs. He is also a section commander which includes the responsibility of organizing and overseeing 450+ individuals, ranging from surgeons to respiratory therapists to clinic technicians. Burgess is married and has two children. His daughter, Taran, graduated from Truman with a BSN in 2014.



Bob & Kalli Massop

Bob Massop, '09

Several Truman nursing graduates have pursued a career as a physician, including Bob Massop. After graduating from Truman with a BSN, Massop accepted a job as a circulating nurse in the operating room near his hometown in Wausau, WI. During his time there, he met Kalli who, in 2012, became his wife. He started medical school in 2011 at Des

Moines University in Iowa and most recently started an anesthesia residency at University of Wisconsin - Madison. Massop stated, “I can’t count the number of

times that my nursing career was helpful during med school and residency. Nursing isn’t typically a pre-med college major, but it was incredibly helpful, not only for medical knowledge, but also patient communication and understanding the team approach to patient care. Without question, the numerous skills I learned at Truman have made me a better doctor.”

Kirk McCarty, '98

Following graduation, McCarty was given the opportunity to work for Governor Carnahan focusing on finding qualified appointments to the state healthcare boards and commissions. After a few months, he started working as a Registered Nurse in the Intensive Care Unit at Research Medical Center (RMC) in Kansas City. During 16 years at RMC, he met his wife, who is also a nurse. They have three children - Isaac 6, Sam 10, and Izzy 12.

McCarty worked in the ICU for a few years and entered nursing management. He spent eight years managing departments including ICU, Telemetry, ED, Dialysis, PCU and Trauma. Around 2005, he was selected for the Chief Nursing Officer Development program with HCA. He spent a few years working as the Associate Chief Nursing Officer for RMC. As his career continued, McCarty was promoted to the Vice President of Operations for the same hospital where he started as a graduate nurse.

In 2015, McCarty was promoted to Chief Operating Officer of Sky Ridge Medical Center in Lone Tree, CO. In his role as COO, he has continued his nursing executive leadership while also being responsible for much of the other operations of the hospital.

McCarty concluded, “I believe that my education at Truman prepared me for all that I have done. As you can tell my career has been far from traditional. By receiving a liberal arts education it prepared me for everything I faced. It also opened my eyes to the different directions you can go in this world no matter your degree. I’m proud to be a Truman Alumni.”
