Message from Janet L. Gooch, Ph.D., CCC-SLP, Dean, School of Health Sciences and Education

The Student Research Conference is just around the corner – April 16, 2013. This event highlights Truman's undergraduate and graduate student research and creative activities and I am very happy to see that our school is well represented in the program. I highly encourage everyone to participate and hope that you will entice your students to participate, perhaps by connecting their participation to a course goal or assignment. Here are some statistics from our school: All of our departments are represented in the program. Our school is sponsoring 30 of the 227 oral papers on the agenda and 11 posters. The oral papers and posters are presented by 70 different students in the school and mentored by 18 different faculty members. Some students are presenting more than once and there are faculty members who have mentored several projects. There are 4 oral papers and 2 posters that were mentored by faculty teams. One of the two posters with two faculty memtors was a collaborative project with a faculty member at ATSU. There are a number of projects that involved the local schools and/or area agencies and many with an interdisciplinary focus. Many thanks to those who mentored projects, cooperated with students in the completion of their studies, and will attend the presentations.

The benefits of a research experience are many and include helping the student to: enhance their professional or academic credentials, clarify their career path, understand the research process in their field, learn a topic area in depth, develop a continuing relationship with a faculty member, learn to work independently, learn laboratory/clinical techniques, learn tolerance for obstacles faced in the research process, understand how a scientist thinks, understand how professionals work on real problems, enhance their written and oral skills - to name just a few. It is widely recognized that students who actively participate in research tend to be more fully involved in their educational experience, and those experiences are often life-changing and/or career-modifying. This is especially relevant for undergraduate students who are in the formative stages of career exploration and discovery. It is likely that many more students would willingly participate in research, and more faculty members would be delighted to accommodate them, but the process by which such faculty-student connections are made often tends to be ad hoc. To encourage additional faculty-student connections based around research, I am starting a small initiative in the school. For the 2013-2014 academic year, I will provide five, \$500.00 "mini-grants" to students and faculty who engage in research. As a result, I hope to see our involvement in the SRC increase for spring, 2014. I will provide additional details soon; however, the grants will be made available through an application process, will encourage the involvement of multiple students, and/or faculty who do not have a strong record of mentoring undergraduate research (proposals that involve two faculty members, one who will serve to assist the other in the mentoring process). A maximum of \$500.00 will be awarded and can be used to fund related research expenses or attendance at a professional meeting to present the results. I realize that \$500.00 is not a lot; however, I hope it will be enough to incentivize more student-faculty research projects. More information on this initiative - coming soon!

News from the School of Health Sciences and Education Departments

Communication Disorders

On March 6, CMDS students Ms. Rachel Pattermann and Ms. Julie Bangert, in cooperation with Quota Club of Kirksville, presented an educational program to third, fourth, and fifth grade students at Ray Miller Elementary as part of Quota Cares month. Focused on hearing conservation/protection, the program provided information about the anatomy and function of the ear, the dangers of sound exposure, and how to protect ears/hearing. All Ray Miller students were provided with a pair of ear plugs to use in noisy environments. In conjunction with the program, Quota is sponsoring a "Crank It Down" poster contest asking children to submit posters of original art that portray the theme of hearing protection.





The Communication Disorders Department hosted a wrap-up event for their *50 for the 50th* anniversary campaign, February 23, in the Health Sciences Building. The goal of the campaign, which began last March, was to raise \$50,000 in honor of the program and the speech and hearing clinic's 50th anniversary. Featured remarks were provided by Dr. Maria Di Stefano and Dr. Janet L. Gooch, who announced the establishment of the new Dr. Cornelis Koutstaal Study Abroad Scholarship. This newly endowed scholarship honors the legacy of former CMDS chair and division head Dr. Koutstaal, while providing students support for the transformational experience of study abroad. Check presentations at the event were made by the Truman chapter of Delta Zeta and RiteCare Valley of Columbia (Scottish Rite). CMDS would like to thank all alumni and friends of the clinic who made this campaign a success. Total donations far exceeded the goal.



As a culminating experience, CMDS majors complete a senior capstone project. Half of the class worked together to set up Hearing Awareness Days in the Student Union Building. The students went to local places, such as the library, basketball games, restaurants, bars, and movie theaters, to measure the sound levels. This information, as well as information about acceptable duration of noise exposure, was provided to other Truman students when they visited the information table in the SUB. In addition, students could test the sound level of their music devices using "Jolene", the CMDS mannequin. The CMDS students also collected information about Truman students' hearing through a hearing questionnaire. Tuesday, April 16 is World Voice Day, when the other half of the class will provide information on voice care.

Health and Exercise Sciences



Fourteen athletic training students and the entire athletic training faculty visited the Missouri State Capitol on February 20 to visit with Missouri legislators about the athletic training profession and Truman State University. Students helped to provide new legislators with information on athletic trainers and the importance of medical coverage for active individuals.

Three athletic training graduating seniors passed their Board of Certification exams on the first attempt. Mr. Bryan Beachem, Ms. Kourtney Bowyer, and Ms. Megan Purk are all new certified athletic trainers. Results for these students continues the program's 100% first-time pass rate for the 2013-2014 academic year.

The Health and Exercise Sciences Department congratulates the following students on their hard work and acceptance of their research by the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM) 60th Annual Meeting and 4th World Congress on Exercise in Medicine. They will present their research May 28 - June 1, in Indianapolis, IN. Each group was skillfully mentored by Dr. Jerry Mayhew. Jayme B. Reynolds, Kirsten A. Maakestad, and Jennifer L. Hill submitted three abstracts and all three were accepted: "Prediction of Bench Press Strength from Anthropometric Dimensions in Women of Different Strength Levels," "Comparison of Selected Prediction Equations to Estimate 1RM Bench Press in Women of Different Strength Levels and Repetition Ranges," and "Effect of Free-Weight and Machine-Weight Training on Upper-Body Strength Gains in Low-Fat and High-Fat College Women." Anissa Angelosante, Melissa A. Jenson, Lynda Cosgrove, Dan Martin, and D. Fred Peterson will present "Alterations in Physical Fitness of Medical Students during Their First 2 Years." Emily K. Dalton and Rebecca A. Rockamann submitted two abstracts and both were accepted: "Impact of Strength Level and Repetition Range on the Accuracy of 1-RM Bench Press Prediction Before and After Resistance Training in College-Age Women" and "Impact of Strength Level and Repetition Range on the Accuracy of 1RM Bench Press Prediction Before and After Resistance Training in College Men." Richard Schumacher, Jerry L. Mayhew, Fontaine C. Piper, William F. Brechue, Jody L. Clasey, and Abbie E. Smith-Ryan will present "Validation of BIA and Skinfold Prediction Equations to Estimate Body Composition in College Football Players."
