Message from Janet L. Gooch, Ph.D., CCC-SLP, Dean, School of Health Sciences and Education

Although the beginning of the academic year is a busy and hectic time, I hope that many of you will take advantage of the opportunities (with quickly approaching deadlines) that are available to faculty this year:

First, the Truman Academic Development Support (TADS) grants offered through the Provost's Office meant to help faculty enhance their teaching, scholarship, and creative endeavors. Second, the SHSE Mini-Grants - a maximum of five, \$500.00 mini-grants will be awarded to support faculty and student collaborations in research. The goals of the mini-grant program are:

- To increase faculty-student research collaboration particularly among faculty who have less experience mentoring student research
- To increase faculty mentorship of other faculty in support of growth in the area of mentoring student research
- To increase interdisciplinary research and collaboration among faculty and students across departments in the SHSE
- To increase opportunities for students to present at the Truman State University Research Conference and other academic conferences
- To increase opportunities for undergraduate students to develop and apply research skills and learn components of ethical conduct of research

Preference will be given to projects that involve multiple students, are mentored by faculty who do not have a strong record of mentoring undergraduate research, involve multiple faculty one serving as a mentor to another with less experience in the mentorship role, and/or are interdisciplinary in nature and involve faculty and/or students from multiple departments in the school. Guidelines were sent out to all SHSE faculty but if you need them again, just ask. Deadline is Friday, September 20, 2013.

Third, it is my hope that our school puts forward a number of sabbatical proposals. The Sabbatical Guidelines for 2014-2015 can be found at: http://provost.truman.edu/Sabbatical Guidelines 2014 7-11-131.pdf Potential benefits of a sabbatical are many. A sabbatical serves as an agent of rejuvenation and renewal and provides a time for reflection. A sabbatical leave furnishes a fresh perspective, provides an opportunity to build new professional relationships, provides opportunities to become or stay current in the discipline, and enhances teaching. Her dissertation and interest areas include the impact of language on literacy, adolescent students, learning disabilities, and behavior disorders. Her roles in education have included speech-language pathologist, learning specialist, and special education department chair within a public school setting, working with students in K through 12. Dr. John Jones comes to Truman from Charleston, SC, where he was a high school special education teacher and adjunct instructor at the College of Charleston. His Ph.D. is from The Pennsylvania State University in educational theory and policy. Dr. Jones' wife, Jennifer, is a temporary instructor in chemistry at Truman. Joining the Department of Health and Exercise Sciences are Ms. Nicole Buck, Dr. Adam King, Dr. Darson Rhoads, and Dr. Alicia Wodika. Ms. Buck will serve as assistant athletic trainer. She will travel with the men's basketball team and assist with track and football. She will also teach and serve as a preceptor for athletic training students on their clinical rotations. Dr. Adam King received his Ph.D. in kinesiology from The Pennsylvania State University and has most recently served as a teaching and research assistant at PSU. The over-arching theme of his research emphasizes the change and variation in motor behavior across multiple time-scales to understand control mechanisms and how individuals acquire motor skills. August Graduation

The Truman August Class of 2013 was 156 strong, with 48 graduates (31%) coming from the School of Health Sciences and Education. The Communication Disorders Department had 5 graduates: 1 for BA, 3 for BS, and 1 for MA in CMDS. The Education Department had 20 graduates from the MAE: 3 elementary; 1 exercise science; 1 foreign language; 5 mathematics; 8 music; 1 special education; and 1 visual arts. Health and Exercise Sciences had 11 for BS in Exercise Science and 12 for BS in Health Science, for a total of 23.

Advanced Placement Summer Institutes

Advanced Placement Summer Institutes were held on the Truman campus this summer. Truman's institutes are endorsed by the College Board and are designed to prepare teachers to teach college-level AP courses in a variety of disciplines. The institutes enable teachers to understand the AP curriculum and to develop strategies, syllabi, resources, and materials for use in AP classrooms. Four institutes were held in June and five in July. The institutes held in June were biology, French language and culture, statistics, and world history. The institutes held in July were calculus AB/BC, chemistry, English language and composition, English literature and composition, and United States history. Truman faculty teaching institutes include Dr. Timothy Farley, Dr. James Guffey, Dr. Sally West, Dr. Todd Hammond, Dr. Anne Moody, Dr Barbara Price, and Dr. Jeff Gall. Enrollment was up by more than one-third over 2012, with 114 teacher-participants. All but three were from Missouri, with one from Illinois and two from Kansas. Teachers from 50 different public school districts, 13 private/charter schools, 1 international school, and 2 military bases were present at Truman institutes, with a combined 987.5 years of total teaching and 125.5 years of teaching AP. Feedback from participants and consultants was overwhelmingly positive. Additionally, The Boeing Company has partnered with Truman in a special initiative designed to increase academic achievement in mathematics and science among Missouri high school students, with focus in St. Louis schools. As a result of The Boeing Company's generous donation, teachers satisfactorily completing the Advanced Placement Summer Institutes of biology, calculus AB/BC, chemistry, or statistics at Truman and teaching in Missouri schools during the coming academic year, received a \$500.00 grant for purchase of professional materials to enhance their Advanced Placement classrooms.

CMDS faculty and staff led students on a Communication Disorders Experience in Mexico, in Puerto Vallarta, May 12 – 21. The purpose of the study was to give CMDS students service learning experience in working with Spanish-speaking populations while earning clinical clock hours. Students were immersed in a variety of settings, including Refugio Infantil orphanage/school and Pastitos de Luz day care center for students with significant disabilities. While at the day care, the students presented a \$1,000.00 check from money raised by the Truman student Communication Disorders Association to purchase a large food processor to help prepare the many dysphagia diets required for the children. Other days were spent visiting museums, art galleries, and historical sites.


Ms. Melissa Passe attended a meeting of the National Advisory Council for Speech Language Pathology, June 19-22, where the new test blueprint for the SLP Praxis exam was reviewed and edited. Ms. Passe also attend the Council for Clinical Certification meeting at the American Speech Language Hearing Association National Office, August 14-18, where she was nominated for the chair position of the council.

In an interdisciplinary study mentored by Dr. Carol Cox and Dr. Julia Edgar, Mr. Brandon Stewart (Health Science) and Ms. Rachel Krauss (CMDS) collected data from 50 community dwelling elderly ranging in age from 71 to 100 years old. They examined swallowing function and tongue strength in relation to various measures of frailty. They reported their findings at the Truman Summer Research Symposium.

Education

Students engaged in history-related activities in the morning, with science reading and learning in the afternoon. Here is what KTVO said about the program in their coverage of the event:

"Students were either eager to learn, or just wanted to see their friends during summer break, but either way a record number of students headed back to Schuyler County R-1 for the reading program for kindergarten through 6th grade students. More than 80 students attended the program taught by Truman State University students.

Each room had a different theme and Truman student Erin Hartzel said she had a blast teaching students in the invention room. "There've been a lot them, so it's been loud, but it's been fun," Hartzel said. "And they all seem really excited about it. They were really engaged and excited about the book, which is cool, and the

whole point. We really want to involve them with reading and get their parents involved with reading this summer, so it's exciting that they're excited."

Emily Jameson said she had a great time teaching the students. "I'm in the Wild Wild West room, and we are doing three different activities," Jameson said. "We're doing storytelling around a fake camp fire and having s'mores. We're having sheriff's badges and cowboy vest and then outside we have them panning for fake gold."

Jameson is teaching fourth grade this school year at Schuyler County R-1 Elementary. The reading program was for one day and from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m."

The workshop will be held during the NCTE Annual Convention, Thursday, November 21, in Boston, MA.

Dr. Tim Farley has volunteered to work with Pearson and DESE to develop new content assessments that will replace the Praxis in the state of Missouri. Tim's work will make an important contribution to the development of the new assessment and his understanding of the new content assessment will inform his work with Truman students.

Dr. Lisa Goran was selected to participate in the 2013 Council for Learning Disabilities Leadership Academy Cohort. The purpose of the academy is to build the leadership capacity within the field by providing mentoring and leadership opportunities on a local and national level. Over the course of the next two years, Lisa will have the opportunity to work with leaders in the field of learning disabilities. She will impact professional development for her peers and have the opportunity to network with other members within the Leadership Academy from the current and past cohorts.

Dr. Lisa Goran's proposal, Pre-service teacher field experiences in special education: A Professional Development School, has been accepted for the Teacher Education Division of the Council for Exceptional Children's 2013 Conference, November 5-9, in Ft. Lauderdale, FL.

Dr. Pete Kelly attended the Council for Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) Board of Examiners (BOE) training in Louisville, KY. He was trained as a BOE team member and will commit to serving on site visit teams for the next three years.

Dr. Donna Rhinesmith has been appointed to a three-year term on The Notable Missourians Editorial Board. She will assist in selecting Missourians who will be featured posthumously in fourth through sixth grade level common core standards books. The books will be published by Truman's University Press.

Dr. Wendy S. Miner is serving as Chair of the National Association of Gifted Children middle grades network.

Truman was awarded a \$1.2 million grant through the Robert Noyce Teacher Scholarship Program from the National Science Foundation. Truman's project is entitled "Truman Noyce Scholars Program for Secondary Mathematics and Physics Teaching," and is under the direction of Dr. Ian Lindevald, Dr. Paul Yoder, and Dr. Susan LaGrassa. The project will endeavor to impact physics and mathematics teacher shortages in Missouri and nationwide by creating a dual mathematics/physics secondary teacher preparation track.

2000 MAE alumna Ms. Jamie Smith Manker, Rockwood R-VI Summit High School teacher, was named Missouri Teacher of the Year by the Secondary Department Elementary of and Education. Ms. Manker, a nationally board certified teacher, has taught at Rockwood for 13 years, where she is social studies department chair. She says she works to instill confidence in her students and fellow teachers. "I promote a spirit of self reliance," she said. "My most important contribution has been to change the attitude of the students I teach and the teachers I lead from one of passive acceptance of failure to vigorous drive for success." Ms. Manker and the finalists will be honored at a banquet in Jefferson City, Monday, October 21. She will serve as the state's nominee for the National Teacher of the Year competition.



Health and Exercise Sciences

Dr. Jerry Mayhew accompanied HES students to the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM) and National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA) conferences where students presented a total of 22 research posters.

Dr. Joe Visker directed the Summer Talent Academy for the Health Professions (STAPH) for 31 high school students and was assisted by HES faculty members Ms. Liz Jorn, Ms. Michelle Boyd, Ms. Cassie DeBlauw, Mr. Adam Cline, and Mr. John Venner.



During the Missouri Athletic Trainers' Association (MoATA) annual meeting in June, Ms. Michelle Boyd and Ms. Megan Purk, May ATC graduate, teamed with a hip surgeon and another athletic trainer to present Hip Pathology, Surgery, and Rehabilitation. The presentation took place at St. Louis University's Practical Anatomy and Surgical Education (PASE) center where Michelle and Megan spoke about hip anatomy and performed a cadaver dissection that was presented in 3D. Michelle is the current president of MoATA.

Dr. Alicia Wodika successfully defended her dissertation entitled "Prioritizing Preparedness: Extreme Heat and Climate Change Preparation of Midwestern Health Departments."

Dr. Adam King successfully defended his dissertation entitled "Motor Learning and Force Output Dynamics."

Dr. Jennifer Hurst led TruAdventure. There were six Truman alumni and friends on the trip. They visited Badlands National Park, Yellowstone and Grand Tetons National Park and camped in tents each night. They hiked Bunsen Peak and Mt. Washburn in Yellowstone and did a 14.5 mile hike in Grand Tetons up to 9300ft Lake Solitude. In addition, they whitewater rafted the Snake River and did a horseback riding trip. Preliminary plans for next summer include two different opportunities in the Southwest: a four-day introductory backpacking course which will hike the width of the Grand Canyon and a five-day trip to hike Zion and Bryce Canyon National Parks. More information will be available later.

Dr. James Padfield gave three presentations at the Wilderness Medical Society's conference on "The Wilderness Athlete."

Dr. Brian Snyder and Mr. Andrew Sheets, Exercise Science senior, tested the effects of beetroot juice on individuals who run through a TruScholars grant. The study culminated in testing runners at races in Columbia in June and July. Some racers took a concentrated shot of beetroot juice two hours before the race, while others drank a placebo.

Senior Health Science student Ms. Briana Bonner, who is a McNair Scholar and a Truman Diversity Fellow, was chosen to attend the National Conference on Race & Ethnicity (NCORE) in New Orleans. Ms. Bonner completed her McNair Summer Research Internship with Dr. Joe Visker. Her project is entitled "Are You Satisfied?: An Evaluation of Participant Satisfaction of Adults with Developmental Disabilities Receiving Service from the People Achieving Connections Together (PACT) Center." Briana will present her research at the 21st Annual McNair Research Presentation on Monday, September 9.

Ms. Alan Kramer, 1991 Exercise Science alumnus, was named Assistant Dean of Students at Abraham Baldwin Agricultural College (ABAC) in Tifton, Georgia. Mr. Kramer will also continue to serve as ABAC Athletics Director.

Ms. Anna Kaminski, 2011 Health Science alumna, was named as Health Careers and Health Education Coordinator for Northeast Missouri Area Health Education Center (NEMO AHEC). Ms. Kaminski will endeavor to increase the number of young people entering health care professions in underserved areas of Missouri.

Ms. Katie Stark, 2012 Health Science alumna, was named Head of the Community Development Department at La Isla Foundation in Nicaragua. She is working to pinpoint the cause of the chronic kidney disease epidemic among sugarcane workers. Her many other projects include a legal framework investigation with the Human Rights Department and working with Engineers Without Borders to supply potable water to the rural community.

Nursing

Nursing was recently approved by Missouri State Board of Nursing to add the Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (ABSN) program. Ten second degree baccalaureate students started the ABSN program during the summer. Nursing re-applied to the Missouri State Board of Nursing for a second grant for the upcoming year.

To expand nursing clinical sites for the Accelerated Bachelor of Science in Nursing (ABSN) students, additional students are being placed on alternate schedules, including evenings and weekends, at Northeast

Regional Medical Center, Hannibal Regional Hospital, St. Louis Children's Hospital, Mercy Hospital (St. Louis), Missouri Baptist Hospital, and other locations.

Nursing received continued nursing accreditation for a 10 year period by the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE).

The Philippines Study Abroad program took 16 students to the Philippines in May and June for a three-week experience. This group was the largest study abroad to the Philippines, demonstrating a strong interest in this experience for nursing majors. The time included nursing students providing patient care in a hospital in Manila, and community experiences in rural areas, and a week to see some local sites. Students were paired with nursing students and professional nurses from the Philippines. Dr. Steve and Ms. Kit Hadwiger led the experience.

Ms. Pam Melvin attended the 2013 Boot Camp for Nurse Educators® July 19-22 in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Her poster presentation was "Using Simulation to Increase Students' Self Confidence in Home Health Nursing".

Students participated in hands on simulation activities designed to help them learn about the nursing profession. Here is what The Kirksville Daily Express said about the program in their coverage of the event:

"Clark County junior Eddie Shelton has always wanted to be a physician, saying whenever she's near doctors she can't help but ask them question after question in an attempt to satiate her appetite for learning. Shelton is among 32 like-minded students with an opportunity to immerse themselves in health-related activities in the third annual S.T.A.P.H., or Summer Talent Academy for Professions in Health, camp at Truman State University.

Wednesday marked the mid-point in the week and students spent the afternoon at the university's hospital simulation lab, learning the intricacies of the nursing profession. In once exercise they worked around the hospital bed of "Herman Munster" who was recovering from a vehicle accident. The students needed to identify various hospital errors that could lead to possibly serious complications, and learned those errors account for nearly 100,000 deaths annually in the United States.

For the students, who underwent a difficult application process for the chance to be there, it hardly feels like work. "It's really fun," said Shelton. "I like how it's hands-on. It's really interesting because it's something applying to what I want to be, which is a family physician."

Dr. Joe Visker, a professor in the Dept. of Health and Exercise Science at Truman State and one of the camps organizers, said students come from across the state and from as far away as Michigan to take part. "It's good whenever we have free time, it's nice to talk about where we came from and how different we are," Shelton said. They'll visit A.T. Still University in addition to getting experience in athletic training, psychology, emergency and disaster preparedness, and more. "They really do get a taste of everything," Visker said.

Students must be high school juniors or seniors to qualify. Additionally, they must hold a 3.25 cumulative GPA and 3.5 GPA in basic sciences, and be nominated by a school counselor or principal. Letters of recommendation and standardized test scores are also scrutinized. "It's a fairly rigorous process to get in," Visker said.

The workshop was at the recommendation from a 2002 alumna of the Nursing Department, Ms. Tara Casaway Bealer. A needs assessment of the Adams County Health Department guided the workshop. The target audience was nurses, dentists, dental hygienists, receptionists, and environmental workers of the Adams County Health Department staff. The administrator of the Adams County Health Department, Mr. Jerrod Welch, is also a graduate of Truman. Mr. Welch is developing an ongoing program to enhance services to vulnerable populations in Adams County.

The faculty/staff have been busy with orientation for new students during Truman Week and with clinical orientation and placement. Dr. Teak Nelson, Dr. Stephanie Powelson, and Ms. Carol Race co-instructed Truman Week with 35 first semester freshmen. The students will create a video project about Truman Week and share it in class before mid-term break. The faculty and staff also met with the students on major's day, toured the hospital, and shared a picnic meal.

The faculty/staff have been contacting clinical agencies, and met with representatives of the clinical agencies on August 29. The Nursing Department has over 50 clinical contracts with acute care and community-based health care organizations. Some of the clinical sites for the fall semester include Northeast Regional Medical Center, Hannibal Regional Hospital, University of Missouri Hospital, St. Louis Children's Hospital, health departments, clinics, and many other sites.




Faculty from Truman, A.T. Still University (ATSU), and other schools are working on an interprofessional case competition. More information will be soon available.
