

Message from Janet L. Gooch, Ph.D., CCC-SLP, Dean, School of Health Sciences and Education

Hello Colleagues,



Dr. Dwyane Smith was promoted to Provost of Harris-Stowe State University (HSSU), St. Louis. He formerly served as Vice President for Academic Affairs and is the chief academic officer of HSSU, providing leadership over all academic departments. He is the principal investigator of HSSU's National Science Foundation (NSF) Implementation Grant of \$1.7 million. He was the principal investigator of a \$2.5 million NSF grant as well, the largest in the university's history. Dr. Smith received his Master's in Education Administration from Truman.

Dr. Pete Kelly traveled to St. Louis to meet with Dr. Michelle McClure, Assistant Vice President for Academic Affairs, and Dr. Betty Porter-Walls, Assistant Professor in the College of Education at Harris-Stowe State University (HSSU), and discuss the Cultural Exchange Partnership between Truman's MAE program and the education program at HSSU. The goal of the partnership is to create collaborative learning experiences between education students at HSSU and MAE students at Truman. Dr. McClure is a 2003 graduate of Truman's MAE.




Sophomore nursing students provided blood pressure readings under the supervision of Ms. Kit Hadwiger.
