














Dr. Robert J. Martin, Professor Emeritus of Education, recently published "Connect and Involve: How to Connect with Students and Involve them in Learning."

I WILL CHAMPION policies which promote quality and equality in teaching and learning.


I WILL PROVIDE all students the opportunity to achieve their own level of excellence.

"On October 24<sup>th</sup>, the Education Department hosted a professional Thursday. development session given by Ms. Annie Oliveri via Zoom. Ms. Oliveri is a doctorate student at the University of Texas at Austin, where she studies learning technologies. In this one hour professional development session entitled "Identifying Digital Inequities" Ms. Oliveri addressed the lack of digital equity in the United States. In the session, Ms. Oliveri defined a digital divide as, "The gaps between those with digital access and skills and those who do not." Faculty and students became more aware of the lack of access and the reasons why access might be limited in some areas of the United States. Ms. Oliveri used the 2018 Digital Divide Index https://storymaps.arcgis.com/stories/8ad45c48ba5c43d8ad36240ff0ea0dc7, as a way to conceptualize the digital divides by means of an Interactive Map. At the end of the session, participants were challenged to investigate the digital landscape of where they work (or want to work) and to then conduct a digital audit on this area. Ms. Oliveri provided excellent resources for faculty and students to utilize when addressing digital inequities in the classroom. ## Health and Exercise Sciences

Health Science students, with funding from Missouri Partners in Prevention, and the support of Residence Life, created and distributed "Drive Safe. Drive Smart" goody bags for students in the Residence Halls. Tables were set up in Missouri, Ryle and Centennial Halls with paper bags filled with highlighters, tire pressure gauges, and phone accessories such as pop sockets and card wallets with reminders to "Buckle Up Phone Down." Making the tables "self-serve" allowed students to maintain social distancing while obtaining important driving safety reminders. The paper bags may be used to store masks and face coverings between washings as well.





Members of the Student Public Health Association (SPHA) did their part in keeping Kirksville beautiful this month. The organization has adopted a ½ mile of Illinois Street and members work together every fall and spring to clean up the litter. This year felt a little different, but SPHA members managed to maintain social distancing and still contribute to making Kirksville a safe and clean place to live, work and go to school.

Saturday, October 24 was World Polio Day. The HLTH 405 Global Public Health class raised \$160.00 to help eradicate polio. Their donation was matched 2:1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates foundation, resulting in a total contribution of \$480.00. Kirstyn Dietle, a sophomore health and exercise science student, has been accepted as an Area Health Education Center (AHEC) Scholar. AHEC helps provide the necessary skills and competencies needed to better serve rural and undeserved communities. They have a self-paced curriculum, and offer internship, experiential, and service learning opportunities. Kirstyn found out about the program through Dr. Roberta Donahue and subsequently reached out to Laura Wallace in Kirksville. To apply, Kirstyn went to the AHEC scholars website, filled out a questionnaire, gave references, and submitted her resume. Kirstyn said that she believes it will affect her future by helping her better understand rural communities like the ones she is from, and how to better serve and advocate for them. Kirstyn grew up in rural Northeast Missouri, and has seen firsthand the issues that surround access to health education and health services. She wants to use the training and certifications she acquires through this program to serve people that live in areas and deal with the issues that are so near and dear to her heart.
