The Center for Academic Excellence (CAE) houses our professional academic advisors, who work with all new students at Truman. We offer personalized guidance and academic support to help you find and study your passions as you discover your distinction.

Beginning at Orientation, a professional advisor partners with you to offer personalized guidance on your academic planning so you can make the choices that are right for you.

ACADEMIC ADVISORS

All new students are assigned an academic advisor with the CAE. Our professional advisors will work with you throughout your first year until you transition on to a faculty advisor in your declared major during your sophomore year.

For students who have not declared a major by then, the CAE continues to work with them on major and career exploration.



Your advisor will help you develop an academic plan that addresses your unique abilities, aspirations, and interests so you're better prepared to make the academic choices that are right for you.

TUTORING SERVICES

The CAE also houses Truman's Tutoring Center and Communication Lab. Our tutors are highly trained and are vetted by faculty, offering subject-specific tutoring as well as learning strategies support. University-sponsored tutoring is free to all students.

Truman students can declare double majors or combine a major with one or more minors. Although only one major is required to graduate, many of our programs pair well together to help you stand out after graduation.

LIBERAL ARTS AND SCIENCES

Truman's curriculum is **perfect for undecided students**. A liberal arts and sciences curriculum allows you take courses in variety of areas, counting those courses toward either your future major or a graduation requirement (or both!). For Undeclared students, this means you won't fall behind if you declare later or make a change in major.
